LTC CELEBRATES ADULT ED WEEK

Lincoln Trail College celebrated Adult Education and Family Literacy Week with several events.

Lincoln Trail College thanked the United Way and the Lincoln Trail College Foundation for their support of the Adult Education program with the Improving Live Scholarship. Learning Skills Center Director Rena Gower says the scholarship has been very important in helping students obtain their GED.

“We’re so blessed for their funding because one of the biggest barriers to getting a GED is paying for the test. The United Way and LTC Foundation’s Improving Lives Scholarship helps pay for the GED test. Since February of 2015, the scholarship has allowed 19 tests to be taken. That’s resulted in three finishers, one passing three of the four tests and the others having passes one or two portions.”

Gower says the scholarships are really an investment in the community because getting a GED leads to students getting jobs and being an active part of the community.



Students in the GED program also got a chance to learn outside of the classroom. The students visited the VFW’s Military Museum in Robinson.

“A lot of them had never been there before and they were very excited and ready to take their families back,” says Gower. “Part of adult education is opening doors to other avenues of learning. We know that education is more than just book learning. It is understanding different cultures and different ways of life and seeing the different things out there.”

The students in the program were also rewarded with a pizza party.

Meanwhile, the college is getting ready for its next round of GED classes. Eight-week classes begin on October 19. There’s an orientation on October 14. Students that want to enroll can call Gower at 618-544-8657 ext. 1134.

“I will tell anyone coming back to school that it is not easy, but it’s never too late,” says Gower. “I was a non-traditional student and I can relate, but it’s just a matter of commitment. We have everything out here for you. The classes are free, we pay for the books and your pencil and paper. The Improving Lives Scholarship can pay for your tests. You have to be committed and you have to want it. You can do it.”

CAMERATA ILLIANA PRESENTS HOLOCAUST CANTATA

The Lincoln Trail College Music Department announces their newest choral ensemble, the Camerata Illiana will present Donald McCullough's Holocaust Cantata as well as Thomas Tallis's Lamentations of Jeremiah in their concert debut October 23rd at 7 p.m. at the Zwermann Arts Center on the Lincoln Trail campus. An encore presentation is set for 3 p.m. (ET) at the St. Stephen's Episcopal Church in Terre Haute on October 24th.

The Camerata Illiana is a professional-level, project-based ensemble under the direction of Jeshua Franklin and will feature soloists Tara Gallion, soprano, and Becky Miller, mezzo-soprano. SIU Carbondale music faculty member Jeremiah Selvey will be the baritone soloist and his colleague, Eric Lenz will be the cellist.

The Holocaust Cantata, which premiered in 1998, was developed from original music sung by incarcerated inmates in Holocaust concentration camps. Working from translations of original Polish materials found in the archives of the United States Holocaust Memorial Museum in Washington, D.C., Donald McCullough fashioned a haunting choral tribute to the six million Jews who were systematically persecuted and murdered at the hands of the Nazi Party.

In addition to the choral remembrance, the Camerata Illiana have invited David Hasty of Oblong to speak on Auschwitz on Friday evening. On Saturday, Terry Fear of the CANDLES Holocaust Museum and Education Center in Terre Haute will speak.

Tickets for the concerts are \$10, but admission is free for anyone with a valid student ID. Advance tickets can be purchased by calling the Lincoln Trail College Performing Arts Office at (618) 544-8657 ext. 1433.

Xavier Brown rounds out the cast as the Waldgrave's son, Thor.

Set in Terre Haute, Indiana, *The Nerd* details the hilarious dilemma of a young architect who is visited by a man he's never met but who saved his life in Vietnam—the visitor turning out to be an incredibly inept, hopelessly stupid “nerd” who outstays his welcome with a vengeance.
