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Lincoln Trail College joined other community colleges across the nation in celebrating National Career and Technical Education Month in February.

Career and Technical Education plays a vital role in meeting workforce demands by preparing individuals for high-skill, in-demand jobs. This spring, Lincoln Trail College has 186 students in CTE programs.

“Career and technical education is at the heart of our mission at Lincoln Trail College,” said LTC President Kathy Harris. “We partner with local businesses and industries to make sure that our students are prepared for the workforce when they earn a degree or certificate.”

That contact with business and industry drives the programs. Advisory boards made up of business and industry leaders meet regularly to help make sure LTC’s programs are meeting the

demands of the industry.

One good example of the importance of the advisory boards comes from the Broadband Telecom program. That program rebranded based off of recommendations from the advisory council. “The industry has evolved beyond just telephone service,” said program lead instructor Jesse Allen. “High speed Internet really drives the industry and more phone providers have expanded their offerings into voice, video and data.”

The rebranding of Broadband Telecom also included some changes in classes. For example, students now take classes dealing with topics like cellular services and wireless Internet. There’s also more concentration on fiber optics.

Lincoln Trail College is also looking at other ways to partner with industry. “We’re constantly looking for different ways we can work with our community partners,” said Dean of Instruction David Carpenter. “We’re currently developing an apprenticeship program flexible enough to serve a number of different industry types but are also constantly seeking innovative approaches that serve both students and employers.”

“Our career and technical programs are geared toward success,” said Harris. “Our programs invest in our students in many ways. Our instructors are experts in their fields and bring a wealth of industry experience. We provide the latest technology and skills to our students to prepare them to become successful employees and future leaders.”



## HIGH SCHOOL STUDENTS LEARN WELDING THROUGH DUAL CREDIT



Lincoln Trail College is giving area high school students the chance to learn welding skills through a dual credit class.

In addition to learning the welding trade, instructor Reno Bemont says the program helps make sure the students are more well rounded, and that makes them more employable in the future. “The world of employment is changing quite a bit. Companies are now looking for people that are well rounded. They want people that are able to do a lot of different things and that’s what we try to do.”

Bemont says while the students are in the program, he tries to expose them to every kind of welding and cutting process available at

Lincoln Trail College. That allows the students to get a lot of hands-on experience while they’re in the program. He also encourages the students to continue their education after finishing the one-year certificate program.

Students hone their skills by working on projects. They’ve been building small backhoes called Billy Hoes children can sit on and use in a sandbox. The students plan to donate what they’ve built to area daycare centers.

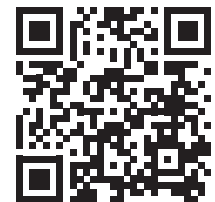
“In the class we do a lot of welding to practice welding,” says Oblong High School student Avery Inboden. “This project allows us to apply those skills and actually build something from the ground up. It’s taken a lot of teamwork and we’ve had some rough patches where we’ve messed some things up and we had to come back and fix those things and improvise. That’s been a great learning experience.”

Bemont says the project has helped teach the manufacturing process. Students worked on the design and then had to make each piece before assembling the final product. The project blends new materials with recycled materials like old disc blades. It also features a wooden seat. Students fabricated all of the pieces and used welds and bolts to assemble each new Billy Hoe.

Robinson High School student Cole Wesner says working in the program has been great for him. “It means a lot to be able to be trusted to use a lot of really expensive equipment and to learn a lot of different trades. Down the road, it’s going to help me decide what I want to do with my career.”

Inboden says the welding program has really influenced his career decision. “I’ve always been interested in welding, but now that I’ve been able to practice it and do it every day, I’ve really started enjoying it. I’m really thinking about pursuing a career in welding.”

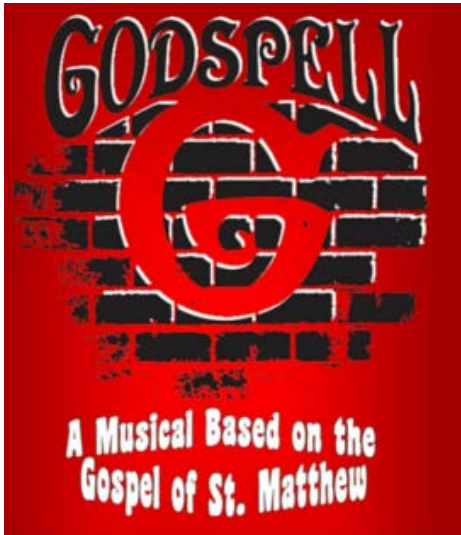
Bemont says even if students don’t pursue welding for a career, they walk away with a valuable skill. “This may not be what they want to do for a job, but maybe this skill they learn will help them fix and repair things they want to work on. They might be able to help a friend or a family member. In the long run, this is going to help them a lot.”

## LTC PROVIDES SCHOOLS WITH TRAINING SERVICES



Lincoln Trail College is helping other schools in Crawford County with their training needs.

In January, LTC President Kathy Harris and Dean of Instruction David Carpenter talked with teachers at Robinson High School about dual credit during an in service.

In February, LTC President Kathy Harris and instructors Pauletta Gullett and Janice Aikman assisted Palestine Grade School faculty and staff in the American Heart Association CPR class. Approximately 40 employees were trained in Adult, Child and

Infant CPR, obstructed airways and in the use of an AED.

LTC is also working with the Robinson Police Department to help train people how to be prepared for school and workplace shootings. Coordinator of Marketing and Public Information Chris Forde and Robinson Police Officer Chad Weaver are certified ALICE instructors.

Forde and Weaver worked with the faculty and staff at Nuttall Middle School in January. They brought the ALICE program to Lincoln Grade School in February. The two also worked with about 40 employees at Crawford Memorial Hospital in February.



## PROSSER NAMED MARCH TRIO SPOTLIGHT
