Commencement May 10

Lincoln Trail College's 43rd annual commencement exercises will be conducted at 7 p.m. May 10 in the college gymnasium.

Michael Correll, Illinois Eastern Community Colleges board member, will confer degrees and certificates. IECC board member John Brooks will give the "Charge to the Class". The welcome will be given by LTC President Mitch Hannahs. Kathy Harris, LTC dean of instruction, will present candidates for degrees and certificates. Barbara Shimer, instructor of drama/theater, will announce the candidates for graduation, and the Rev. Phil Boyd of Hunt City Congregational Christian Church will give the inspirational reading and closing reflections.

Providing the processional and recessional marches will be the LTC Concert

Band directed by Jeshua Franklin. Brassmasters will provide prelude music, and the LTC Statesman Singers, under Franklin's direction, will provide special music for the evening.

Honor graduates, those who have received a 3.50 or better cumulative grade-point average on a 4.0 scale, will wear gold honor cords and receive a gold seal on their diplomas in recognition of academic achievement. Members of Phi Theta Kappa honorary society will wear traditional gold stoles. Phi Theta Kappa members will sell roses prior to the commencement ceremony.

Honorary marshals are Caleb Begle of Jasper, Ind., and Kayla Burner of Sims, Ill.

Graduates and guests are invited to the commencement reception in the cafeteria immediately following the ceremony.

Registration under way

LTC is registering students for summer intersession and eight-week summer semester classes.

Classes in the following subject areas begin June 5: business, college preparatory, computer, education, English, communications, speech, Spanish, health occupations, health and physical education, humanities, math, life science, and social science.

Condensed progressive courses are: Elementary Spanish I (SPN 1111), June 5-July 1, and Elementary Spanish II (SPN 1121), July 2-31; and Intermediate Spanish I (SPN 2112), June 5-July 1, and Intermediate Spanish II (SPN 2121), July 2-31.

Condensed courses, which allow students to complete coursework in less than eight weeks, include: First Aid and Safety Education (PEG 1137), May 14; Pastels (ART 2198), July 11 to Aug. 1; Beginning Music Theory (MUS 1112), June 24 to July 31; General Microbiology (LSC 2110), May 13 to July 3; Human Anatomy and Physiology I (LSC 2111), May 13 to July 3; and Human Growth and Development (PSY 2109), May 13 to July 3.

Summer health and fitness courses include: Circuit Fitness Training (PEI 1100), Karate (PEI 1109), Aqua Aerobics (PEI 1138), and Advanced Circuit Fitness Training (PEI 2100).

Online offerings through LTC this summer include: Applied Accounting (ACC 1101), Cinema Appreciation (ART 1141), Managerial Effectiveness: Personnel (BUS 1102), Principles of Business (BUS 1103), Principles of Macroeconomics (ECN 2101), Composition and Analysis (ENG 1121), Introductory Meteorology (GEG 1103), History of Eastern Civilization II (HIS 1105), Intro to Asian Culture (HUM 2151), Introduction to Literature (LIT 2101), American Literature to 1855 (LIT 2111), English Literature since 1800 (LIT 2122), Shakespeare (LIT 2151), Technical Math (MTH 1201), Intro to Ethics (PHI 2101), Philosophy of Religion (PHI 2121), Ethics in the Medical Community (PHI 2141), Intro to Physical Science (PSC 1101), Adolescent Psychology (PSY 2105), Abnormal Psychology (PSY 2111) and Marriage and Family (SOC 2103). Prior to enrolling in an online class, students must successfully complete Intro to Online Learning (CIS 1104).

Regular eight-week summer courses begin June 5 and conclude with final exams July 30 and 31.

Students not eligible to receive college credit may take the class on a non-credit basis. Cost is \$80.

Triathlon set for May 25

LTC and Ecton Hardware are currently planning the May 25 Crawford County Triathlon.

A 175-meter swim will kick off the event at 8 a.m. in the LTC pool. It will be followed by a 12-mile bicycle ride and a 3-mile run. The competition is limited to 150 swimmers who will compete in the following male and female age groups: 18 to 28, 29 to 39, 40 to 50, 51 to 59, and 60 and older. Participants may compete individually or as a team.

Defensive Driving scheduled for June

Several National Safety Council Defensive Driving courses (DDC-4) will be offered throughout the Illinois Eastern Community Colleges District during June.

Classes will be offered from 6 to 10 p.m. June 17 at Wabash Valley College Science Building Room 55; June 18, Frontier Community College Foundation Hall; June 19, Olney Central College Wattleworth

Hall Room 114; and June 20, Lincoln Trail College Harry L. Crisp Educational Center Room 106.

The DDC-4 course is a classroom "face-to-face" course. It is accepted as an assigned driving course as required for traffic-related court supervision. Some insurance companies will provide a discount for successful completers of this

course. Participants successfully completing the one-night course will receive a National Safety Council, DDC-4 Certificate. The cost for this class is \$50. Special rates are available to senior citizens wishing a refresher on safe driving skills.
