Frontier Community College held its New Student Orientation (NSO) on Wednesday, August 7. The annual event was held in Workforce Development Center and drew over 120 incoming students.

After a welcome by Jan Wiles, Assistant Dean of Student Services, new students broke out into small groups and rotated throughout campus to learn about various services and opportunities. Breakout sessions included: Student Success, Student Services 101, Learning Resource Center & Online Services, Club Exploration, and a Faculty & Student Panel.

Students returned to Workforce Development Center for lunch prepared and served by the First Baptist Church of Fairfield. As the fall semester kicks off with a schedule full of transfer and CTE classes, so too will begin a plethora of Community Education classes and workshops. Frontier's Community Education committee has been hard at work this summer preparing the schedule, and they are pleased to announce that over 20 classes will be offered to the public.

Class offerings are catered to a wide variety of interests, ages, and skill levels. Several classes are returning favorites or back by popular demand, including ballroom dancing, book club, yoga, and quilting. Phyllis Gill will offer multiple stained glass classes at Gill's Glass Shed, located between Fairfield and Clay City. Gill has been teaching classes for over 20 years, and you can find many projects created by her students at the annual Community Art Show on Frontier's campus.

Several classes are new to Frontier and were added based on feedback provided from a community survey last year. Options include self-defense, acrylic painting, furniture refurbishing, and Latin American cooking. Due to the rising popularity and curiosity over CBD oils, a one-night CBD Oils 101 class will be led by local pharmacist Stephen Potts. Holiday-themed workshops will occur as the semester progresses, such as Pie-Making, Christmas Cupcakes, and Barn Quilt Painting (holiday pattern).
