Open to the Public

CPR is a lifesaving technique useful in many emergencies, including heart attack or near drowning, in which someone's breathing or heartbeat has stopped.

Frontier Community College is partnering with Hosselton Funeral Home to offer a CPR/AED/First Aid class on Saturday, June 20, at the Community Center in Cisne.

The one day class is open to the public and there is no tuition charge to attend. There is a \$3 fee for the American Heart Association completion card.

CPR training prepares individuals to recognize and respond to cardiac arrest, respiratory arrest and foreign-body airway obstruction. The training will provide step-by-step instruction for using cardiopulmonary resuscitation (CPR) when needed. Students will also be instructed in the use of an automatic external defibrillator (AED) machine.

Frontier Community College (FCC) is welcoming its new Dean of Instruction, Dr. Paul Bruinsma. The Illinois East-

Colleges Board of
Trustees approved the hire at
the March board
meeting.

Bruinsma assumed the role on June 8 and will oversee the career and technical programs, transfer programs, and full-time faculty.

Bruinsma will also work closely with the college president, Dr. Jay Edgren.

Bruinsma comes to FCC from North Central Missouri College (NCMC) in Trenton, Missouri, where he was a physical sciences instructor since 2006. His teaching experience includes instruction in the traditional classroom setting, online courses, and dual-credit courses. Bruinsma is familiar with student assessment and interacting with staff and faculty from all college departments.

During his time at NCMC, Bruinsma served as a member of the Strategic Planning Team, chaired the Negotiations and Student Concerns Committees, and Faculty Senate President.



He played an instrumental role in the HLC (Higher Learning Commission) accreditation for the college, serving on the Steering Committee and the Editing Team for the HLC self-study.

In 2011, Bruinsma received the Governor's Award for Excellence in Teaching and the

NISOD Excellence Award (elected by faculty). Also in 2011, he represented the Missouri Community Colleges at the Higher Education Summit in Indianapolis, Indiana.

Bruinsma holds a Bachelor of Science degree from Purdue University in Biology with minors in Chemistry and French (1996) and a PhD in Genetics from the University of Missouri (2002).

Residing in Wayne City, Bruinsma and his wife, Lacey, have two daughters, Sophia and Ellie.

Spotlight on Service Award

Presented to Jan Herman, Adult Literacy Tutor

Jan Herman, an Adult Literacy Tutor at Frontier Community College, has been presented a Spotlight on Service Award presented by Secretary of State and State Librarian Jesse White's office and the Illinois Press Association. Herman was one of 10 literacy tutors in the state of Illinois to be chosen for this award and recognized during a ceremony held on May 13 in Springfield.

In January 2014, Herman began tutoring a small group at Red Brush Creek Church in Louisville. They needed tutoring in English as a Second Language. The group spoke very little English so a translator was needed to get

the class started. Now just over one year later, the students have shown remarkable progress and have gained at least one reading level.

For the past two years, Herman has also been tutoring a community learner with a learning disability. They meet on a weekly basis, and the student has improved by two reading levels. He enjoys checking books out at the public library to read. One of his goals was to be able to read the directions and make macaroni and cheese. With the progress he has made, he can now read and carry out the directions on his own.

Herman has been a strong advocate for adult literacy for several years. In 2011, Herman retired from Illinois Eastern Community Colleges (IECC) as the Coordinator of Literacy in the Adult Education Program.

Spotlight on Achievement Award Presented to Lisette Lopez

Adult Literacy student Lisette Lopez of Flora was recently presented with a Spotlight on Achievement award presented by Secretary of State and State Librarian Jesse White's office and the Illinois Press Association. She was one of 10 in the state of Illinois to be recognized and presented this distinguished award at a ceremony on May 13 in Springfield.

Lopez was nominated by Linda
Sargent, Coordinator of Literacy
Development at Frontier Community
College for the entire Illinois Eastern
Community Colleges District. "We
are so proud of her," said Sargent,
who arranged for Lopez to receive
one-on-one tutoring. "When she came
to us four years ago, she could barely
speak any English. She has dedicated
herself to school and she has really
done well."

A native of Lima, Peru, Lopez moved to Flora with her mother and sister. Recalling when she first arrived to

the rural area, she said, "I could say, 'hello,' which I learned in kindergarten, but that was it. It was very hard and

frustrating. People couldn't understand me and I couldn't understand them."

Lopez began meeting twice a week with a tutor at the Flora Public Library. Together they reviewed basic greetings, money and numbers. As she progressed, Lopez and her second tutor began working on grammar. "I moved on to writing sentences," Lopez said. "My conversations were getting better and my writing improved." After a year of tutoring, Lopez enrolled in classes at Olney Central College.

Lopez has made great strides and this May she graduated with an Associate in Science and Arts degree. She has been accepted to the University of Illinois in Chicago, though she is still looking at other options. She plans to transfer to a university this fall to begin work on a degree in Chemical Engineering.
