


## Large Crowd Celebrates FNB Field Dedication

A crowd of over 250 people were on hand for the inaugural home game for Bobcats Baseball at FNB Field on Frontier Community College's campus.

A field dedication ceremony was held prior to the Bobcats game against the Wabash Valley College Warriors on April 4 to officially open the home of the Bobcats FNB Field.

The ceremony kicked off with the sibling trio Cheryl Harl, Denise Kinney, and Ronald Hallam performing the National Anthem. The Fairfield American Legion Color Guard presented the flags during the National Anthem. WFIW Radio's Bruce Dickey served as the M.C. for the event, introducing FCC President Dr. Jay Edgren for the recognition of special donors. FCC Foundation President Sarah Rush recognized the Foundation and their generous assistance with FNB Field. Illinois Eastern Community Colleges CEO Terry Bruce then recognized the IECC Board of Trustees. Next, he unveiled the scoreboard that was donated in memory of longtime IECC Board of Trustee Member Marilyn Wolfe.

FNB President Mike Copeland and FCC's first president Richard Mason gave dedication remarks just before Mason threw out the ceremonial first pitch to Copeland.

The first pitch at FNB Field was officially thrown at 6 pm to kick off the game against WVC, who took the win, 11-1.
