## Classes returning to Wattleworth Hall after fire

Olney Central College classes will be returning to Wattleworth Hall on March 16 after a fire resulted in its closing late last month.

OCC's main classroom building sustained extensive smoke damage following a second-floor electrical fire on Feb. 21.

Portions of the facility were closed while cleanup and repairs were underway.

Work included replacing electrical and data wiring as well as ceiling tiles. The building's duct work also was cleaned.

The college was closed on Feb. 23. Classes resumed the next day for programs housed in other buildings.

Limited classes were held Feb. 25 at the West Richland Center, formerly West Richland High School, in Noble. Classes continued meeting at the facility.

Some nursing classes also were held at Richland Memorial Hospital.

# OCC students attend Chicago Auto Show Feb. 20

Students from the Olney Central College Automotive Service and Collision Repair Technology Programs attended the annual Chicago Auto Show on Feb. 20.

They were accompanied by Automotive Instructor Tyler Boyles, Collision Repair Instructor Mark Fitch and Frontier Community College Automotive Instructor Rodney Maxey, whose students also participated.

A few OCC Welding students also

attended the show.

First staged in 1901, the Chicago Auto Show is the largest auto show in North America and has been held more times than any other auto exposition on the continent. This year marked the 107th edition of the Chicago Auto Show.

The Chicago Auto Show utilizes more than 1 million square feet in the North and South Exhibit Halls of the McCormick Place complex. Exhibitions included: multiple

world and North American introductions; a complete range of domestic and imported passenger cars and trucks; sport utility vehicles; and experimental or concept cars.

In total, nearly 1,000 different vehicles were on display. Those attending also had the opportunity to see numerous accessories and auto-related exhibits, competition vehicles and project, antique and collector cars.
