Walking path improvements made thanks to students' fund-raising efforts

Improvements have been made to an Olney Central College walking path through the efforts of the Student Senate and the OCC athletes.

Former Student Senate President Derek Sager and Senator Brianna Farris, a member of the Lady Knights Basketball team, spearheaded the project for the walkway, which links the campus, its ball fields and the privately owned housing for OCC athletes.

Student Senate

Advisor Allan Alldredge said water was pooling in low-lying areas, creating mud and making it difficult for students to navigate the path as they walked to classes and games.

The Student Senate and OCC athletes sold trash bags to generate the funds needed to purchase rock to both raise the path and improve drainage. The Student Senate also contributed additional monies to cover the \$900 cost.

The Student Senate originally planned to

purchase 30 tons of rock, but supplier Doll's Inc. in Olney was able to procure the material at a lower rate enabling the group to acquire an additional 7 tons.

"Doll's wanted to help and they passed the savings on to us," Alldredge said. "We really appreciate their help."

The rock was delivered in late May and the Student Senate members spent about eight hours raking, smoothing and packing the path.

Alldredge said the Student Senate is working on another campus improvement project for next year. The organization hopes to purchase classroom charging stations for student phones and other electronics.

Alldredge noted the Student Senate still has 15-, 39- and 55-gallon trash bags for sale. They may be purchased at the reduced price of \$10 per roll by contacting Alldredge at 395-7777, ext. 2019.

IECC makes Top 50 list of Best Value Community Colleges

Olney Central College continues to receive national recognition for its quality education and affordable cost.

The Illinois Eastern Community Colleges District, which includes OCC, Frontier Community, Lincoln Trail and Wabash Valley colleges, has been named one of the Top 50 Best Value Community Colleges of 2016. IECC ranked number 16 in the

nation — the highest of any Illinois institutions to make the list.

Value Colleges selected institutions offering the best return on educational investment while combining "affordability and quality so that graduates can be assured that their hard work and hard-earned money aren't wasted."

Using data from College Measures, a Gates Foundation-supported database, Value Colleges surveyed the nation's 1,717 community colleges that offer two-year associate's degrees. To make the initial cut, institutions had to have graduation rates of more than 45 percent, low-to-average costs of less than \$10,000 per year, enrollments of more than 1,000 and American Association of Community Colleges' memberships.

Value Colleges found 614 institutions met

the criteria. The top 50 ranking is derived from the highest scoring schools based on three metrics: graduation/transfer rate (Integrated Postsecondary Education Data System database), mid-level salary for graduates (when applicable/from payscale.com), and actual tuition (IPEDS database).

"The Illinois Eastern Community Colleges more than adequately prepare students for transfer," Value Colleges noted. "They have also made a commitment to accessibility, keeping their tuition rates at a low \$83 per credit for in-district students, and not much more for those coming from elsewhere."

Earlier this year, USA Today and Schools.com ranked OCC the No. 1 Community College in Illinois. OCC also was named an Aspen Prize Top 150 U.S. Community College.

Softball captures record-setting 41 season wins

The Olney Central College softball team ended its season with a school record-setting 41 wins under the guidance of Coach Nick Short.

The Lady Knights also set new records for hits (659), doubles (108), triples (24), RBI (353), and runs (418).

The team finished 41-24-1 overall, the program's seventh consecutive season of 30 or more victories.

The Lady Knights earned several postseason honors. Hollie Jones of Terre Haute, Ind., was voted as the Great Rivers Athletic Conference's Freshman Player of the Year.

She led the nation with 113 hits, which broke the previous team record of 76. She hit .483, which was 20th in the nation and scored 76 runs, which was 17th nationally.

Jones and sophomore Kayala Hoppenjans, of Ferdinand, Ind., were selected firstteam All-GRAC Conference. Jones also earned Region 24 first-team status.

Hoppenjans, freshman Baylee Waters of West Terre Haute, Ind., and sophomore Christian Chambers of Shelburn, Ind., were named to the Region 24 All-Tournament Team in softball.

GRAC All-Academic Team honors, which require a minimum 3.25 GPA, went to Chambers, Hoppenjans and sophomores Mindy Garrelts of Milford, Tori Stamper of Sullivan, Ind., and Brittany Voils of Terre Haute, Ind.

National Junior College Athletic Association Academic Exemplary Awards, for GPAs of 3.60-3.79, went to Waters and freshman Bailey Bruce of Indianapolis. Hoppenjans received the Superior Award for GPAs of 3.80-3.99.

The Lady Knights earned an NJCAA Softball Academic Team Award with a combined 3.22 GPA.
