LSC celebrates with open house

OCC's Learning Skills Center celebrated National Adult Education and Family Literacy Week Sept. 22-26 with an Adult Education Open House on Sept. 23.

Adult education and family literacy programs serve adult students who need to improve their basic literacy and math skills, improve their oral and written English, prepare for the GED tests to attain a high school equivalence degree, and transition to community college, vocational training or employment. In Richland County, 7 percent of adults have extremely limited literacy skills and/or English language proficiency.

The LSC serves an average of 200 adult students annually. Every year approximately 40 students earn their GEDs. Many of those students enroll in college while others use their newly earned GED to get a better job. In Richland County, 11.6 percent of adults 24 and older have not earned a high school diploma or GED.

EDU 2198 Topics/Issues in Education (Parenting) will meet in Room 109 of the West Richland Center, formerly West Richland High School in Noble. The class will be held from 6 to 9 p.m. on the following Thursdays: Nov. 6, 13, 20 and Dec. 4 and 11.

"It really is a good class and it will help participants to be a better parent to their children," she said.

Sargent, who has worked with families in the past

through the Department of Children and Family Services, will help participants identify their individual parenting styles and teach them how to apply those effectively in the interactions with their children.

Children can push your buttons, Sargent said, but through the course parents will learn how to keep their emotions intact and administer affectionate discipline.

"We've all heard about children who were shaken in anger and injured," Sargent said. "A decision made in one second can change everything."

During the class, parents

will learn what steps they can take to reduce their children's behavior problems, deal with power struggles and establish better communication. Sargent also will discuss child safety and CPR as well as the importance of proper food and nutrition.

"What a child is eating can affect their behavior," she said. "If you're trying to reduce bad behaviors, but you're giving the child snacks with sugar, you are defeating the purpose. What you eat makes a difference."

ENT 1210 Intro to Entrepreneurship is the first course for OCC's Entrepreneurship Certificate. The class will meet in a condensed schedule for eight weeks from 6 to 8:30 p.m. on Tuesdays and Thursdays in Room 105 of the West Richland Center, formerly West Richland High School, in Noble.

GED enables student to land her dream job

Earning a GED enabled Olney resident Ashlyne Denzler to land her dream job.

"I always wanted to do hair, nails and makeup, and now I am," said the 25-year-old, who is employed at Serenity Escape Day Spa in Olney. "It's a great feeling. I always wanted to make people look pretty."

Denzler's journey to her new career began in January 2013, when she decided to enroll in Olney Central College's free GED classes. Denzler, who left high school at 17, said she had started GED classes before, but was unable to follow through.

"Before, I thought I had better things to do," she said. "But, I decided I needed to come back and

get my degree. My boyfriend was there to support me in this and he helped me to finish. The GED teachers also helped and supported me. They told me I could do it."

While preparing for her GED, Denzler also participated in the Learning Skills Center's Transition

Skills Class. The course assists students as they transition from GED classes to college courses or the job market. The class covers a variety of topics from applying for Financial Aid and taking the COMPASS Test to resume writing and career planning. The class also assists students with setting goals.

After earning her GED degree, Denzler enrolled in OCC's Cosmetology Program. She started classes in August 2013.

"A lot of my classmates helped me," she added. "People supported me at school and at home."

Denzler's hard work and dedication also qualified her for a scholarship OCC awards to GED graduates who want to continue their education. Students, who meet the criteria, can receive \$1,000 per semester for two semesters to cover their tuition costs.

"I was super excited to get the scholarship," she said. "It meant I didn't have to pay. It really helped."

Denzler graduated from OCC in May and started her job the next day.

"They put me to work from day one. I do all kinds of things from highlights and haircuts to nails and facials," she said. "Earning my GED helped me to succeed at what I wanted to be. Now, I wish I had started when I was younger. Cosmetology is hard, but it is also a lot of fun."
