Lt. Gov. Sheila Simon visits OCC

Lt. Gov. Sheila Simon brought her Complete College Illinois Tour to Olney Central College on June 24.

Simon is touring each of Illinois' 48 community colleges to promote the state's goal of increasing the proportion of working-age adults with college degrees or certificates to 60 percent from 41 percent by 2025.

Simon is examining best practices at each institution and hopes to share innovations with other community colleges across the state.

"We can fix what is not working in our higher education system with what is already working in our system," Simon said. "We must learn from each other to reduce barriers to college success and create an educated workforce."

Simon said other institutions may be able to learn from Olney Central College, which was recently ranked among the top 120 community colleges nationwide by the Aspen Institute. The selection was based upon graduation and transfer rates as well as the number of low-income and minority students who completed their programs of study and if those rates improved over time.

Simon also plans to share information with state officials.

"I will be able to report to the governor and legislature what is going on at our outstanding community colleges," she said.

During her visit, Simon told faculty, staff and community leaders the state wants to assist OCC and other two-year colleges in the effort to help students make the transition between high school, the community college and four-year institutions.

"It doesn't always work as seam-

lessly as we want it to," she added.

Simon fielded questions from the audience on a variety of issues ranging from the effectiveness of standardized testing to the shortage of nursing faculty.

Financial Aid Director Vicki Stuckey asked about funding for the Monetary Awards Program Grant and Illinois Veterans Grant Program.

"The governor is a strong advocate of MAP and has worked hard to restore what was cut out of the budget," Simon said. "He understands the value of MAP in making higher education available to everyone and not to people just of a certain income level."

Single Parent Program Coordinator Ashley Charleston told Simon one of OCC's biggest assets is the ability of faculty and staff to establish personal relationships with the students.

"I know size has an impact on an institution," Simon said. "There is more opportunity at a smaller institution to be able to know people and to catch those who are struggling before they fail."

She added, "Community colleges are such an amazing resource for our state and are often overlooked. They open the door to a big range of possibilities for students and the community."

Simon concluded her visit by touring the campus with OCC President Rodney Ranes.

In addition to OCC, Simon visited Frontier Community College, Lincoln Trail College and Wabash Valley College, which are also part of the four-college Illinois Eastern Community Colleges District.

Blue Knight Golf Classic


The OCC Blue Knight Golf Classic will be held Friday, July 29 at the Richland Country Club.

Step 1: Log into your Entrata account with your username and password. Click on the Banner Web icon at the right-hand side of your screen.




Step 2: Click on Pay Tuition, Fees, and Other Charges Online — Credit Card to make your online Payment.

OCC emergency alerts

Illinois Eastern Community Colleges has contracted with e2Campus to provide alert notification services.



The system will notify students and employees of campus emergencies and closures by e-mail and/or cell phone text message. Log onto Entrata and click on the alerts link to activate an account.

IECC Alerts is an opt-in service. While there is no direct cost for signing up for the service, you may be charged a text message fee by your cell phone provider. Please check your cell phone plan to understand the costs you may incur using the service.

The system will be used to send text messages related to campus emergencies, weather-related closures, test messages and notifications when accounts are about to expire.
