TESTING CENTER TO OFFER OVER 6,000 TESTS

Lori Noe, Robert Tennyson, and Terry Chratt have been working very hard to get Frontier's newest addition, The Testing Center, ready to go for this year's test season. In the past, students have been required to travel to take different exams used for various certifications across numerous fields of study. With current credentials, FCC can now offer over 6,000 different official tests that students, employees of local organizations and high school students can take.



In addition to the Pearson VUE certification that was already held by FCC, the Testing Center has been created to meet the unique specifications required to administer Prometric ASE Testing used by Automotive Programs across the nation to certify Automotive workers to different levels of content mastery. With the new additions, the testing center can now offer exams from Pearson, Prometric, Accuplacer, CASAS, the ACT, and Prometric.

Frontier Community College and the Learning Resource Center are excited to host this wide variety of tests for our students and the community. The ability to host these exams will bring new people to campus and helps further engrain FCC as a staple in the local educational community.

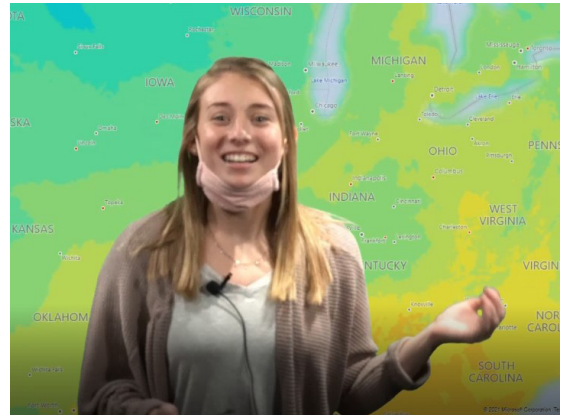

TITLE III UPDATES

The Title III program is one step closer to the planned renovation of Mason Hall Rooms 22 & 23 Science labs. Sealed bids for the project were to be received by May 7, 2021 with bid opening scheduled for Thursday, May 13, 2021. The project is slated for completion on August 1, 2021.

Recent Title III work has focused on identifying an online tutoring provider to pilot online tutoring services for Title III Grant associated classes including Med Lab Tech and hybrid Math classes. An online tutoring service has been found that can provide 24/7 online tutoring services available in both English and Spanish. Look for further details soon.

Staff and faculty surveys along with local professionals will be used to develop engaging information and guidance for students as they learn to navigate important financial issues including student loans, savings, insurance, and debt management. Several students answered “roving reporter” questions during the FCC Spring Fling event related to Financial Literacy. Portions of the interviews will be embedded in the Financial Literacy content to enhance the course and provide some lighthearted moments
