Frontier Community College's Phi Theta Kappa (PTK) chapter, Beta Alpha Lambda, is pleased to announce three members have been named to the All-Illinois Academic Team. In the fall, PTK members apply for scholarships and up to four students can be nominated to the All-Illinois Academic Team. 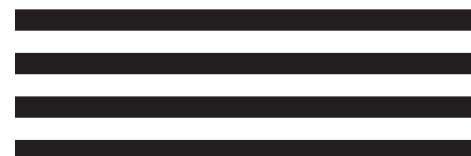

ADVISOR EXPLORES AUTOMATION OPPORTUNITY

FCC Academic Advisor Kara Blanton has been working behind the scenes on a project to automate a portion of the registration process. Bookings, a Microsoft 365 product, is an application that provides an adaptable way for students to schedule appointments. Bookings works directly with Outlook and provides students with a real-time link to schedule their advisement appointments.

Kara knows the need for this platform and the convenience it will afford students. It is convenient, eliminates the need for callbacks, and will send the student a confirmation and reminder texts once the appointment is scheduled. Bookings is ready to exit test mode for live beta testing with a small group of students.

Kara has worked on the back end of the platform to make sure the proper questions are displayed to the student and that the right amount of time is shown for scheduling options. Ultimately, Kara hopes the link will be on the website for students to find easily. This is an exciting, student-focused initiative that FCC is excited to pioneer.

DISSECTION GOES DIGITAL

Students in Human Anatomy and Physiology I and II have a new opportunity in the classroom. FCC recently purchased an interactive Anatomage Virtual Dissection Table. Users can visualize anatomy exactly as they would on a cadaver. Nixie Hnetkovsky, Life Science Associate Professor, says the advantage of the Anatomage Virtual Dissection Table is that students can see the entire body and its internal structures all at once. It also gives every student the opportunity to perform dissections - unlike with real organs where there may only be one available.

“This is a huge jump forward for our department” says Hnetkovsky. She has wanted this technology for nearly three years. Students in the class are excited as well.

AN ARRAY OF POSSIBILITIES

Construction is underway on the 45kW solar array on the campus of Frontier Community College. The project is funded by a \$120,750 grant from the Illinois Green Economy Network (IGEN). Located north of the Workforce Development Center (WDC), the solar array will provide both green energy to help power the campus and educational opportunities to students in the Automotive Technology and Electrical Distribution Systems programs.

Installer Jeff Overturf, owner of Overturf Electric in West Frankfort, Illinois, expects the system to be complete and fully operational by the middle of May.

His company has extensive experience with solar array installation and has been the lead on similar projects throughout the Midwest.

When complete, power from the solar array is projected to offset roughly 50% of the energy consumed by the WDC. This savings, coupled with expanded programmatic opportunities, makes having the project on campus a welcome *green* addition.

Business & Industry Training

B&I is partnering with LWIA 23, DCEO, the Flora Chamber of Commerce, and the City of Flora to hold a Business Roundtable discussion and small business gathering on May 19 in Flora.

Adult Education

The Adult Education (AE) program held an Area Planning Council (APC) meeting in March on the campus of Lincoln Trail College. The APC meetings bring service partners together to discuss new services, opportunities, and challenges. AE is expanding English as a Second Language (ESL) services by adding an in-person class in Grayville and a fully online class this summer.

Emergency Preparedness

With relaxed restrictions, CPR classes are now back in session for students in all 16 district high schools. In collaboration with Kaskaskia College, a Paramedicine cohort is being established at Wabash General Hospital for this fall.

TITLE III UPDATES

The following updates are from Title III Project Director, Carol Dreith.

This past month, Title III team members Carol Dreith and Derek Dunn met virtually with University of Illinois professionals Eric Schumacher and Kevin Southworth of the University's Center for Innovation in Teaching to develop additional strategies in maximizing the faculty recording studio layout and functionality at FCC. Eric and Kevin both provided recommendations stemming from their vast experiences in lighting, recording, and green screen production. The Title III team is working to implement the team's recommendations and is looking forward to providing the campus and community with the latest in video production technology.



Collaboration with University of Illinois Production Team

This is an exciting time for the first cohort of Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) students as they enter the final stretch of their two-year academic journey at FCC. At this time, three large regional lab employers have sponsored recruitment lunches on the FCC campus designed to attract these future MLT graduates to accept employment at their facilities. Clearly, MLT graduates are in high demand, and they have a bright employment future ahead. As part of the program accreditation process, the self-study for the National Accreditation Agency of Clinical Laboratory Sciences (NAACLS) was recently submitted. Once accepted, graduates are able to sit for the national exam to become certified MLTs. A site visit by NAACLS is expected in the fall.

Title III Steering Committee and Internal Monitoring Team meetings were conducted in recent weeks to assess the success of the project through the end of Grant Year 2 and to evaluate Year 3 Goals and Objectives. On April 1, 2022, the five-year grant reached the "half-way" mark; therefore, the work of both teams is important in reflecting upon project successes to date and anticipating any grant modification requests or resources required to ensure future goals are achieved. As more course content is transitioned to hybrid delivery and additional online student services are developed, the goal of increased student accessibility to higher education offered through Frontier Community College should be realized.
