OCC student advances to national welding competition

Olney Central College student Tyler Dowty is one of 16 finalists selected to compete in the 2022 Project MFG National Welding Competition in Wichita, Kan.

Dowty was among 78 competitors from 13 states who participated in the qualifying round. The Claremont resident received a \$500 cash award for advancing with the chance to win \$10,000 at nationals on June 28 at Wichita State University Tech.

"I was pretty happy learning I was selected," said Dowty, who just completed his first year toward

an associate degree in welding. "I thought the welding process was difficult and we really had to challenge ourselves. I've learned a lot about welding while I've been in the program. This was a chance to prove myself as a welder and to get better at it."

Dowty's classmates Lane Bradley, of Newton, and Jacob Taylor, of Olney, also participated in the challenge. Taylor was one of eight students selected as alternates to the national competition.

"It was a cool opportunity," Bradley said. "It was a chance for us to prove ourselves against the big welding schools."

Project MFG executes skills competitions designed to restore America's manufacturing prowess and attract new talent to skilled trade fields. The tournament-style competitions give hands-on experience in problem-solving and technological aptitudes required for success for the next generation of machinists, welders, programmers, mechanics and fabricators.

For the competition, students had to follow blueprints and Welding Procedure Specifications to fabricate a stainless-steel pressure vessel. Materials were shipped to OCC and the students completed their projects in the Welding Lab before returning them for judging. The vessels were tested for leaks and judged on appearance and fit up.

"I thought it was a neat idea," said Welding Instructor Curtis Marshall. "Everyone from across the country could participate without having to travel to one location. I'm proud of the guys for doing this. It wasn't required and they did it on their own time. It was a good way to showcase their welding skills and get experience reading blueprints."

He added, "I think it is a good reflection on the program when one of our students is chosen as a finalist. It shows we have a good, solid program."

Miller named College Admissions Representative

Thirty-two Olney Central College athletes earned Academic All-American status in 2021-2022. Baseball led the way with 18 total, followed by softball with eight and men's and women's basketball with three each.

Overall, softball had a team GPA of 3.47, women's basketball earned a team GPA of 3.40 and the baseball and men's basketball teams finished the academic year with team GPAs of 3.36 and 3.34, respectively. As an athletic department, the overall GPA for all four sports was 3.38.

Individual Academic All-Americans fall into three categories: First Team (GPA 4.0), Second Team (3.80-3.99), and Third Team (3.60-3.79).

First Team Academic All-Americans include baseball players Nick Sutherlin, Connor Christopher and Zach Duenas along with Carlene Weiler and Molly Sheehan, members of the softball team.

Second Team Academic All-Americans are baseball players Blake Donnan, Will Gibbs, Noah Wagy, Gage Stevens and Cole Lambird; softball players Jessie Martin and Lanae Greifzu; and Allison Harris, a member of the women's basketball team.

Anderson Library Gallery Summer Exhibit features works by two local artists

The Anderson Library has opened its gallery this summer to feature works by local artists Bob Treece and Joe Gower.

"I really hope people enjoy it and the space," said Chad Groves, Director of Instructional Support Services. "It is something a little bit different and I hope people will stop in to see it."

Both artists are originally from Olney. Treece attended The Art Institute of Chicago and paints in both realist and surrealist styles. Galleries in Chicago and St. Louis exhibited his artwork while he was living in those cities.

Treece says of his artwork, "My realist paintings are in oil on canvas, usually painted from life and in some cases photos. My surrealist paintings are manifestations of unconscious, undifferentiated energy I am only just aware of and am fiendishly fascinated by."

Treece's surrealist pieces consist of poured or splattered paint, digitally manipulated printouts of previous paintings, ink, charcoal, spray paint, plastic and fire. Treece also is known for his murals, which are featured in The Holiday dining room and outside Hovey's restaurant.



Gower has lived throughout the United States. A former OCC art instructor, he also taught on a Native American reservation. His work includes paintings and 3-D drawings.

"Both are really dedicated and good at their craft," Groves said. "I think they are a very good pairing, I'm thrilled to have them and have other people here to enjoy their work."

Groves hopes to exhibit works by other local artists in the future.

"This is something I would like to continue doing," he added. "I would like to use the gallery space more than we have. It brings a certain energy and excitement to the place."

Groves encourages the public to view the exhibit which runs through mid-August. Gallery hours are 7:30 a.m. to 4 p.m. Monday through Friday.

For this Disney cabaret, 25 percent of the people involved have never been on our stage. They are also coming from other counties. OCC Theater is getting a great reputation for a place that puts on high quality shows that challenge performers to get better in a fun and encouraging environment. Our production team has really put in the work, and we are seeing the results of that work pay off exponentially."
