

Career Opportunities

According to the Bureau of Labor Statistics within the U.S. Department of Labor, opportunities for correctional officers are expected to be excellent.

Employment of probation/parole officers and correctional treatment specialists is projected to grow 9 to 17 percent through 2014. This projection stems from mandatory sentencing guidelines calling for longer sentences and reduced parole for inmates, and from expansion and new construction of corrections facilities.

Some employment opportunities also will arise in the private sector, as public authorities contract with private companies to provide and staff corrections facilities.



Admission Procedures

1. Secure the admission application packet from the Student Services Office, file the completed application with the Admissions Office and pay the appropriate application fee.
OR
Apply online at www.iecc.edu.

Students seeking admission to degree or one-year certificate programs must then follow these steps:

2. Complete college placement exam (ACT, SAT or IECC-administered COMPASS; call the Student Services Office for details). The purpose of the testing is to assist the student in course selection and to improve the probability of student success in college-level work. Failure to take this test will preclude registration as a degree-seeking student for the second term.
3. Submit an official transcript of the high school record or the high school equivalency (GED) and certificate test scores to the Admissions Office.
4. Submit official transcripts and appropriate course descriptions of all previous college work to the Admissions Office prior to registration.
