Nursing is the career where science and art, high-tech and human touch still connect. The newest advances in science and technology are incorporated into direct client care through prevention, diagnosis and treatment of health conditions and delivery of services.

The Illinois Eastern Community Colleges nursing program graduates practitioners who demonstrate professional values and adhere to professional practice standards and ethical codes. General education and nursing courses prepare students to interact with diverse populations across the life span.

Students are provided varied clinical experiences to facilitate responsibilities of the practitioner. The focus is on provision of care, delegation and management, membership within the profession of nursing and commitment to lifelong learning.

Educational Options

The IECC nursing curriculum offers students educational credentials and opportunities for licensure during progression through the program. Students are eligible to take examination for licensure as a practical nurse, LPN, after the first year and the summer semester. Students may exit at this point or use these enhanced skills and credentials to work within the nursing profession as they continue to complete the two-year program for eligibility for RN licensure.

LPN and transfer students interested in entering the program may be eligible for advanced placement status. The nursing program offers bridge courses which allow students to enter the program with recognition of prior achievements. Verification of education, certification or licensure is required.

Application Process

Persons interested in applying to the nursing program should contact the nursing office at one of the four colleges in the IECC District. The nursing office will provide prospective students with program information, an application, and a partial copy of the Illinois Nursing Act. Completed applications for fall semester must be received at the college site by February 15 to be ranked. A completed application includes: all college and high school transcripts; GED scores, if applicable; a completed IECC application form; ASSET or COMPASS test scores; a Nursing Program Applicant Information Form and residency verification. Late applications will be accepted pending available space.

Students admitted to the program must complete certification as a nurse assistant. Criterion include: completion of training program within five years of the date of

application, verification of 750 hours of work as a CNA during the 12 months prior to application and inclusion on the Illinois Department of Public Health Registry. If the student has completed an Illinois state-approved basic nurse assistant training course and certification within the past 18 months prior to application, the work requirement is waived. Certification in other states or other health provider qualifications will be reviewed for compliance with Illinois standards. Additional course work or competency testing may be required.

Statewide Articulation Initiative

The IECC/Olney Central College Associate in Applied Science in Nursing degree program participates in the statewide articulation initiative. The program is approved by the Illinois Department of Financial and Professional Regulation (IDFPR) (www.idfpr.com) and accredited by the National League for Nursing Accrediting Commission (NLNAC), which is located at 61 Broadway, 33rd floor, New York City, NY 10006; 800/669-1656, ext. 153, (www.nlnac.org) The PN exit is approved by the IDFPR.
