GED Instructor Development Reflecting on Classroom Success

With the second eight weeks of the semester underway, the Adult Education Department is pleased with the commitment and success of its students. Recent reports indicate strong numbers in the program as well as measurable gains from those who are enrolled. What is contributing to the positive findings, though? Cheryl Holder, Director of Adult Education at Frontier Community College (FCC), indicates a leading factor is the professional development of instructors for the program.

So far this fiscal year, Frontier Community College (FCC) has enrolled 140 students in the Adult Education Program, and many have already taken the computerized exam to earn their GED. Forty-six percent of students have post-tested, and nearly half have increased at least one grade level. Eighteen students have successfully graduated from the program, and Holder expects to see more as the end of the fiscal year approaches.

"It is so exciting to see students working hard and successfully earning their GED," said Holder, who oversees eight GED instructors throughout the district. The 18 graduates were enrolled in GED Test Prep courses in Fairfield, Flora, Lawrenceville, and Bridgeport. Holder noted that instructors play an important role in this success, as "they prepare them [students] to not only pass the GED exam but also move forward with the next step in their lives, whether that be college or straight into the workforce."

The Adult Education Program has been investing in their instructors professionally, and the results are showing all-around. While the state's average instructor retention rate is only 60%, FCC has a 75% rate. All eight instructors have participated in professional development activities to enhance Adult Education instructional offerings. One such activity is STAR, or Student Achievement in Reading, training. This initiative was created by the U.S. Department of Education to assist states and local programs in improving the reading achievement of intermediate-level adult levels.

STAR is a comprehensive initiative for implementing evidence-based reading *(continued on next page)*

instruction (EBRI) with this learner population. Instructors use diagnostic assessment procedures to gauge strengths and weaknesses of each student, then they target the reading instruction accordingly. EBRI helps students improve in the four essential components of reading - alphabetics, vocabulary, fluency, and comprehension.

Instructors must complete a minimum of 12 hours of professional development, and Dena Weber, Program Director of Adult Education, said each instructor within the IECC district is on track to do so.

"The training our instructors receive is really helping with student guidance in the classroom," said Weber. "One particular focus is College & Career Readiness (CCR), and they are trained to use those strategies to better prepare students for the GED and college enrollment."

Separate from the improvements in training, though, is the passion that instructors have for helping others. Holder is quick to note the commitment of these teachers and the strides they take to ensure each student is learning and preparing for a future suited to their interests and dreams.

"I have seen so many students come through this program who need someone to believe in them," said Stacey Legg, instructor for GED Test Prep courses in Fairfield. "In Adult Education, we are their biggest cheerleaders and show them the way to success. My favorite part of teaching these classes is seeing my students gain their GED, move on to a college education, and earn a self-sustaining, life-changing career. There is nothing else like it!"

SNA Hosts Successful Blood Drive

FCC Leading Community on NYC Summer Trip

For the first time, the Community Education program at Frontier Community College is offering a 4-day trip to New York City for interested community individuals. The trip is scheduled to depart Monday, July 8 with a return date of Thursday, July 11. Enrollment for the trip opened at the beginning of February, and the reservations quickly filled up. FCC will be joined by over 25 college students and adults for the trip of a lifetime to The Big Apple.

FCC partnered with Explorica, a travel organization that provides educational tours across the globe, to carefully plan the trip. The package is titled New York City: Landmarks of Manhattan, and travelers will visit popular sites such as the Rockefeller Center, Radio City Music Hall, and Central Park.

The 4-day excursion will include: round-trip transportation from St. Louis, Missouri; sightseeing tours and site visits; hotel stays; daily breakfast and dinner; and a full-time private tour guide. Guests will also have the chance to see a Broadway performance. The itinerary is as follows:
