Mason Named Christmas Parade Grand Marshal

With the college he helped establish celebrating 40 years of service this year, Frontier Community College's first president Mr. Richard Mason was selected as the 2016 Fairfield Kiwanis Christmas Parade Grand Marshal. The honor was bestowed upon Mr. Mason for his continued dedication to faith, family, education and community.

As founding president of FCC, Mr. Mason watched the college grow from 50 courses in the early 1970's to 700-800 courses in the 1980's. He saw the campus grow from one small administration building to six other buildings. He also served as interim chancellor of IECC from the early spring of 1994 until that fall when a new chancellor was named, and he returned to FCC until his retirement in 1996.

"I am very proud of Frontier and its continued growth over the past 40 years," Mr. Mason said. He continues to be involved with Frontier, serving as a member of the Foundation since his retirement, the first ten years as its chairman.

Program Showcase Hosts Students from 10 Area High Schools

Frontier Community College was recently awarded a \$5,000 grant from South East Illinois Area Health Education Center. The Small Grant Awards Program is designed for health professionals who are interested in projects for the advancement of public health.

Leaders at Frontier Community College utilized the grant to provide funding support for the recent FCC Program Showcase that took place on Frontier's campus on November 16. This event showcased the various healthcare training programs available at Frontier Community College in addition to other career and technical and transfer programs available to potential students.

High school students and guidance counselors from throughout the region attended the event. Students from Fairfield, Grayville, Albion, Lawrenceville, Newton, Wayne City, Cisne, Olney, Clay City, and Ob-long High Schools attended the showcase event.

Nearly 130 individuals participated in the day's activities. This event provided an opportunity for potential students to learn more about the various programs available at Frontier Community College.

Potential students were able to interact with faculty and staff during four different informational sessions. Also, the event allowed students to learn more about the process of attending college through discussions surrounding selection of the right career, obtaining financial aid to help fund higher education, and making the most out of the college experience.

Participants had the opportunity to interact with current students throughout the day. Ultimately, the goal of this event was to provide an invaluable opportunity for students to explore the different academic programs and corresponding career options available at Frontier Community College so that they can make informed plans for their future endeavors. The event was a huge success thanks to the support of the South East Illinois Area Health Education Center.

Several Scholarships Awarded in November



The semi-annual Clemence Elizabeth Cox Scholarship has been awarded to Austin Atteberry of Mt. Erie and Bethany Summerfield of West Salem for the 2016 fall semester. The \$500 scholarships are awarded during the fall and spring to second-level nursing students at Frontier Community College. Both recipients will complete the Associate Degree in Nursing in May 2017.

This memorial scholarship has been established by Jerry Cox of Mill Shoals, the son of John and Clemence Cox. Jerry is a retired salesman for Airtex Products, a Southern Illinois University graduate, and a Vietnam veteran.

Grateful for the care that both his parents received in the hospital and nursing home, and knowing the care nurses give to the VA patients, Jerry thought it only fitting to award the scholarship to nursing students.



Logan Hill of Fairfield has been named the recipient of the fall 2016 Debra Jean Withrow Scholarship, a scholarship that is awarded to local nursing students enrolled in the IECC Nursing Program at Frontier Community College. Logan received \$500 and will complete the Associate Degree in Nursing in May 2017.

The scholarship was established in January 2007 in memory of Debra Jean Withrow, a surgical nurse who worked at Fairfield Memorial Hospital at the time of her death in 2005. She was involved in teaching students and served as the President

of the local chapter of AORN, The Association of periOperative Registered Nurses.

The semi-annual Vicky Lemons Memorial Scholarship has been awarded to Teia Esmon and Allison Tullis of Fairfield for the 2016 fall semester. The \$500 scholarships are awarded during the fall and spring to nursing students at Frontier Community College.

Vicky Lemons was well known and loved in the Fairfield community and at Frontier Community College. Serving as a member of the nursing faculty at FCC from 2006 until her passing in March 2015, Vicky played an important part not only in the education of her students, but in their everyday lives as well.

This memorial scholarship has been established by Vicky's family and friends in an effort to give back to the students she loved helping so much. Even in passing, Vicky continues to help students achieve their nursing goals through this scholarship reward.

Luke Vaughan began his electrical career as a Journeyman Electrician at Airtex Products. He later co-founded Vaughan Electric, Heating and Air, a local company that is still in operation today. Luke was an honest, hardworking man that took great pride in his work. He enjoyed

The Memorial Scholarship was set up by his family to assist the recipient on the path to their electrical career in hopes that they find the same fulfillment it brought Luke Vaughan.

Frontier Community College awarded the Earl R. Pottorff Memorial Scholarship to Derek Endicott of McLeansboro. Endicott is currently enrolled in FCC's Electrical Distribution Systems program and will complete the certificate in May 2017.

The Earl Pottorff Memorial Scholarship was established in December 2012 by Lorraine Pottorff in memory of her late husband. It is the first donation presented to the FCC Foundation specifically for a Career and Technical program that will last in perpetuity. The Earl R. Pottorff Memorial Scholarship is presented each year in the amount of \$1,000 to a student enrolled in the Electrical Distribution Systems program.

Colby Hopfinger of Flora has been awarded the Wayne-White Electric Co-op Scholarship in honor of Gerry Kinney at Frontier Community College (FCC) in Fairfield. Colby is currently enrolled in FCC's Electrical Distribution Systems certificate program and will graduate in May 2017.

The Wayne-White Electric Co-op Scholarship in honor of Gerry Kinney was established in the summer of 2016. The cooperative held a fundraiser to raise money to establish a scholarship to enable someone to attend the Electrical Distribution Systems program at FCC. The recipient will learn the trade and skills to begin a career as an electrical distribution lineman, just like Gerry enjoyed for 17 years.

Kinney survived being shocked and burned on both hands with 7,200 volts by a high voltage power line in July 2015. Losing both forearms and hands, Kinney defied the odds by surviving the accident. Kinney now is happy to be able to share his experience with FCC students to reinforce the importance of safety in lineman work.

Jason Downer of Fairfield has been awarded the Steve Rafferty Memorial Scholarship at Frontier Community College (FCC) in Fairfield. Jason is currently enrolled in FCC's Electrical Distribution Systems certificate program and will graduate in May 2017.

The Steve Rafferty Memorial Scholarship was established in March 2014. Rafferty served as the Lead Faculty for the Electrical Distribution Systems Program at Frontier Community College from 2008 until his passing in March 2014.


