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Conference to focus on JFK assassination


This year marks the 50th anniversary of President John F. Kennedy's assassination. In October, Olney Central College will host a free two-day conference, which will bring together nationally-known academics, scholars and authors to lend their perspectives on the events leading up to and following that fateful day in Dallas.

Nearly five decades after Kennedy's death, questions and speculation continue to surround the assassination. OCC instructor and conference organizer David Denton said the event — Changing the Historical Reality of November 22, 1963 — will explore the idea that the version of history put forth by the Warren Commission is untenable.

Denton said the conference speakers will present factual evidence, which questions the Warren Commission's conclusions and offers a different historical reality that takes into account the forces which were aligned against Kennedy. The presenters also will explore the potential means, motive, opportunity and connections, as well as who benefited the most from the president's death.

The conference will be held from noon to 9 p.m. on Friday, Oct. 25 and from 10 a.m. to 7:20 p.m. on Saturday, Oct. 26 in the Dr. John D. Stull Performing Arts Center. Both evenings will conclude with a reception, which will give participants the opportunity to interact with the speakers.

"The conference is open to the public and we encourage anyone who is interested in that period of our history to attend," Denton said. "We will talk about the basic evidence, facts





and witnesses in the case as well as the controversial elements such as the Secret Service protection, the autopsy of the president and the motives and means of opportunity of people who may have been involved."

Although the Warren Commission concluded in its 1964 report Lee Harvey Oswald acted alone in killing Kennedy, Denton said the vast majority of Americans have always believed otherwise and the weight of the evidence confirms their doubts.

Among those who questioned the commission's conclusions was the president's brother and Attorney General at the time, Robert Kennedy. He privately expressed concerns that the official investigation was a "shoddy" piece of work. He even suspected rogue CIA agents and/or Mafia associates may have been involved.

Denton has studied the Kennedy assassination for nearly two decades and has taught the course, Political Assassinations of the 1960s, since 2001. From 1996 to 2000, he participated in the Illinois Humanities Council speakers' bureau giving the presentation, "Lee Harvey Oswald — American History's Most Mysterious Figure."

He annually attends a national conference on the assassination,

which is held in Dallas. Through the event, he established contacts with many of the presenters who will be coming to OCC.

"Changing the historical reality of the assassination has always been an objective of myself and others," Denton said. "There are a lot of people who feel the official version of history we have been given doesn't add up. For them, getting our history right and achieving some level of justice becomes a passion. This is an opportunity to attract some of the top experts in the country to our campus. We want to bring as many facts to light as we can and to create an academic record that changes how the assassination is portrayed by historical textbooks."

Denton, who also is a conference speaker, will discuss the Secret Service as well as the CIA. Other presenters include Douglas P. Horne, Edgar F. Tatro, Phillip F. Nelson, Dennis David, Rick Russo, James Wagenvoord and Judyth Vary Baker.

Horne served on the staff of the Assassination Records Review Board (ARRB) from August 1995 to September 1998. His most important work on the ARRB staff was the assistance he provided to the General

Welding students can participate in new club

Counsel in conducting all 10 sworn depositions of key personnel who conducted, or witnessed, President Kennedy's military autopsy at Bethesda Naval Hospital on Nov. 22, 1963. In 2009, he published the five-volume encyclopedic work *Inside the Assassination Records Review Board: The U.S. Government's Final Attempt to Reconcile the Conflicting Medical Evidence in the Assassination of JFK* — a frank and extremely detailed discussion of the evidence of the U.S. government's cover-up in 1963 and 1964 of the medical evidence surrounding JFK's assassination.

Tatro is a long-time educator, who has taught college and adult education courses for 30 years, specializing in the JFK assassination. He is the author of many research articles pertaining to the assassination conspiracy. His work has been acknowledged or footnoted in many JFK assassination books including *Crossfire* by Jim Marrs, *Reasonable Doubt* by Henry Hurt, *Official and Confidential: The Secret Life of J. Edgar Hoover* by Anthony Summers, *Destiny Betrayed* by Jim DiEugenio, *The Assassinations (Probe Magazine)* by Jim DiEugenio and Lisa Pease, *The Kennedys: Dynasty and Disaster* by John H. Davis, *Killing Kennedy* by Harrison Livingstone, Doug Weldon's essay in *Murder in Dealey Plaza and JFK and the Unspeakable* by Jim Douglass. Tatro served as a minor consultant to Oliver Stone's film, "JFK," and is acknowledged in *JFK: The Book of the Film* by Oliver Stone and Zachary Sklar.

Tatro is the original editor of *Texas in the Morning*, the memoirs of LBJ's mistress, Madeleine Duncan Brown, and editor of the Bugliosi Chapter in *Biting the Elephant* by Dr. Rodger Remington. He contributed research to Sen. Sam Ervin's Watergate investigative committee and the House Select Committee on Assassinations.

Tatro was responsible, via the AARB, for the release of the unidentified print found on a box in the alleged sniper's nest in the Texas School Book Depository and, via the LBJ Library, for the release of the rough drafts of the rough draft of NSAM #273, which he shared with L. Fletcher Prouty, who shared them with Oliver Stone for "JFK."

He was a consultant to Nigel Turner's "The Truth Shall Set You Free" and "The Smoking Guns," parts six and seven of *The Men Who Killed Kennedy* series. He was a primary recruiter and participant in Turner's "The Guilty Men," part nine of the same series.

Nelson has conducted extensive research into the life of former President Lyndon B. Johnson and is the author of *LBJ: The Mastermind of the JFK Assassination* and its sequel *LBJ: From Mastermind to The Colossus — The Lies, Treachery and Treasons Continue*.

David was serving as Chief of the Day at Bethesda Naval Hospital on Nov. 22, 1963 and directed the offloading of the president's body prior to the autopsy. William Law interviewed him for the book *In the Eye of History: Disclosures in the JFK Assassination Medical Evidence*.

Russo is one of the nation's leading experts on President Kennedy's autopsy and served as a key consultant to *The Men Who Killed Kennedy* documentary series.

Wagenvoord was employed as an assistant to *Life* magazine's executive editor at the time of the assassination. In that role, he became deeply involved in the purchase and publication of the Zapruder film. In the years since, he has added important information citing Johnson's ties to corrupt practices in his rise to power.

Baker is the author of the memoir, *Me & Lee — How I came to know, love and lose Lee Harvey Oswald*. A promising science student who dreamed of finding a cure for cancer, Baker describes in her book how she strayed from a path of mainstream scholarship into a life of espionage in New Orleans with Oswald.

She also explains her involvement in a biological warfare project aimed at eliminating Cuba's Fidel Castro. Baker's intimate relationship with Oswald, who she and others say was involved in the anti-Castro effort and was framed in a cover-up, has become the subject of documentaries, plays and books since she first spoke out to *60 Minutes* in 1999.

Her relationship with Oswald is chronicled in "The Love Affair," episode eight in *The Men Who Killed Kennedy* series.

wise-cracking Truvy dispenses shampoos and free advice to the town's rich curmudgeon, Ouiser, ("I'm not crazy, I've just been in a bad mood for 40 years"); an eccentric millionaire, Miss Clairee, who has a raging sweet tooth; and the local social leader, M'Lynn, whose daughter, Shelby (the prettiest girl in town), is about to marry a "good ole boy." Filled with hilarious repartee and not a few acerbic but humorously revealing verbal collisions, the play moves toward tragedy

when, in the second act, the spunky Shelby (who is a diabetic) risks pregnancy and forfeits her life. The sudden realization of their mortality affects the others, but also draws on the underlying strength — and love — which give the play, and its characters, the special quality to make them truly touching, funny and marvelously amiable company in good times and bad.

OCC Theatre atrium undergoes renovations

The atrium in the Dr. John D. Stull Performing Arts Center at Olney Central College has undergone extensive remodeling this summer.

OCC President Rodney Raney said the 37-year-old facility had experienced significant leaks and water damage in recent years, which necessitated the work. The renovations included replacing the existing windows with new energy-saving glass, which will both prevent leaks and reduce solar heating.

Portions of the floor tiles, which had become dislodged due to water damage, also were replaced. The project was funded through Protection, Health and Safety monies and should be completed early this month.

“We are looking forward to the upcoming theater and music events,” Raney said. “With the improvements to the lobby, it will be a more pleasant experience for our students and guests.”

Olney Central College recently purchased a new muscular figure with funding it received from the OCC Foundation.

Instructor Carol Weiler said students will use the three-dimensional model in the Anatomy/Physiology for Massage Therapy I and II classes as well as the Pathophysiology for Massage Therapy course. The new equipment covers all of the body systems addressed in the classes.

Weiler said the intricate model is hand-painted and can be taken apart allowing students to see inside the chambers of the heart and even to

remove the brain. Before acquiring the new muscular model, Weiler had to utilize paper diagrams during class discussions.

"Its visualization as well as the hands-on identification capabilities will enhance the learning experience," Weiler said. "This will help students with identifying body parts, now as students, and even later as massage therapists. It will improve the overall hands-on practical experience one needs in the classroom as well as give the students the skills and confidence to be successful massage therapists."
