


LTC LAUNCHING CUSTOMER SERVICE MANAGEMENT MICROCERTIFICATE

Lincoln Trail College will begin offering a new microcertificate that will help train people to better serve customers in January of 2021. The new Customer Service Management program is available online and is open to LTC students and members of the community.

Customer Service Management focuses on customer service theories, communication, problem-solving, and resolving complaints among other topics. The idea behind the certificate is to give students the skills they need to provide quality customer service.

“One thing that we know is that recent data suggests that 87 percent of customers have actually left a business or left a company because they were unhappy with the service that they received,” says Dean of Instruction Brent Todd. “In addition, seven-to-ten Americans say that they will actually spend more money with a company where they feel that they get an adequate amount of service.”

Todd says the idea of the new Customer Service Management program is to give people a chance to learn how they can build better relationships with customers and better serve customers.

Todd believes the program would be great for LTC students looking at a career in business or public service, but he also believes the new microcertificate program is a great opportunity for local businesses to enhance the skills of their employees.

The Customer Service Management program will be available in a fully online format, making it easier for community members to take the classes. The certificate is six credit hours in length, and it can be completed in as little as one semester.

Customer Service Management is the latest microcertificate to be offered by Lincoln Trail College. Special Events Management and Public Service Management launched in the Fall 2020 semester. Just like Customer Service Management, those two programs are also available online and can be completed in as little as one semester. They are also available to LTC students as well as the public.

ORGANIZATION LOOKS TO ENHANCE THEATER PROJECT



As Lincoln Trail College's Theater Renaissance project gets underway, a new committee is working to enhance the project.

Perfect Pitch is working to add state-of-the-art sound isolation practice rooms to the project. The practice rooms are already in the plans for the new building, but these practice rooms would enhance them by adding sound dampening technology. It would allow students to practice and take lessons without the sounds of other students interfering.

LTC's current practice rooms have concrete block walls, and Music Instructor Rebecca Carmack says they don't provide an ideal environment for education. "They are not soundproofed so you can hear other people practicing or taking lessons and they're very small and dark."

Carmack says the applied music lesson program has been growing over the last few years. She says there's a mix of students taking lessons for credit and community members taking non-credit lessons. She believes enhancements like this will only help strengthen the program.

Perfect Pitch is working to raise money to install Wenger SoundLok Sound Isolation Rooms. The rooms are regarded as some of the best soundproofed practice rooms available. The organization, which is a partnership between the LTC Foundation and people who have a passion for the performing arts at LTC, is hoping to raise \$90,000 for the rooms.

"The Performing Arts at LTC has greatly impacted so many of us, changed and enriched our lives," says committee member Barbara Shimer. "This new building is a wonderful testament to the value of music and theater in our community."



PHI THETA KAPPA FOCUSING ON MENTAL HEALTH



Lincoln Trail College Phi Theta Kappa students helped put a focus on mental health as a part of a college project. As a part of their service project, students in the honor society are drawing attention to mental health awareness.

They kicked off the project in October by promoting World Mental Health Day on October 10. The goal of the day is to raise awareness of mental health issues and mobilizing efforts in support of mental health. Phi Theta Kappa made posters to help students find the resources they need through either their advisors or the National Alliance on Mental Illness.

“We chose this project because as students of Lincoln Trail we were trying to realize what kind of resources we had and how we could help those through their time here at LTC and after,” says Phi Theta Kappa member Madison Workman. “Being able to help even one student can have a huge impact.”

In addition to creating the posters, Phi Theta Kappa students are meeting with LTC administration. Workman says they are providing them with statistics to show how common mental health issues are among college students.

“This is a very important topic because statistics have proven that mental health issues are on the rise for college students. Sixty-four percent of students drop out due to reported mental health reasons while 35 percent of college students have reported that they are struggling with mental health issues. Half of students have admitted to having suicidal thoughts. These statistics are crucial. If we don’t step up now for this common cause, who will?”

Workman says one of the goals of the project is to take away the stigma that mental health issues can sometimes bring. “We want students to feel welcome and unashamed. Our college years can be the best years of our lives but as the most difficult ones. Everyone has battles but coming together and creating a safe environment for students who may need a little help along their journey of education is important.”

DAVIDSON COMMITS TO RADFORD



Statesmen pitcher Zach Davidson will continue his collegiate career at Radford University. The lefty from Hartsburg, Missouri has committed there and will play after he completes the spring season at Lincoln Trail College.

Davidson started out of the bullpen for LTC but quickly worked his way into the starting rotation. Coach Kevin Bowers believes that Davidson will be a weekend starter at Radford.

“He has supreme command and has two or three pitches he can consistently throw as strikes. He has an above-average fastball at 89-91 miles per hour. He’s also tough to beat. Davidson is also unflappable on the mound. He’s always calm, cool, and collected. He’s the kind of guy that will have a smile on his face if he gives up a big hit and is ready to go for the next guy.”

Bowers says Davidson had some other options before coming to Lincoln Trail, but ultimately chose here because he liked the size of the college. He says Radford watched a couple of his games last year and also saw some additional footage. Bowers says Radford wanted to sign him quickly because of his potential.

“He’s already had one unexpected jump in velocity here. He’s a great worker and solid in the weight room. There are a lot of guys that can throw with his velocity, but not many of them have his ability and command. If he keeps that up and continues to build on it, I think he has a shot at playing pro ball.”

BEAUCHAMP COMMITS TO EVANSVILLE

It isn’t often to see a junior college basketball player commit to his next college before he ever plays a game, but that’s exactly what happened with the Statesmen’s Blaise Beauchamp. He announced that he will join the University of Evansville as a part of their Class of 2021. The freshman guard from Minnetonka, Minnesota will have four years of eligibility at Evansville after playing at LTC.

Statesmen coach Luke Stuckey says he was a little surprised Beauchamp committed as early as he did, but he says he landed at exactly the level they expected him to. He says Evansville is a great fit for Beauchamp both on the court and in the classroom.

Beauchamp played at Bella Vista College Preparatory School in Scottsdale, Arizona, and also attended Hopkins High in Minnetonka and Findlay Prep in Nevada before joining the Statesmen. He was a three-star high school recruit by 247Sports and had offers from Siena, California Riverside, and Southern Utah.


“He’s one of the best scorers I’ve coached,” says Stuckey. “He has a great shot and a real knack for scoring. He’s very tough to cover because of his shot. He can also make plays, is a good passer, and is unselfish.”

When LTC’s season begins in January, Stuckey expects Beauchamp to be one of the Statesmen’s main scoring options. “I expect that he’ll carry a large load for our offense.”

Stuckey says Beauchamp has been a winner everywhere he goes and played at a high level in high school. He believes that he’ll continue to rise to the occasion at LTC and at Evansville.



LTC POOL REOPENS




The indoor pool at Lincoln Trail College will reopen on a limited schedule beginning November 1.

“We’re excited that we can open the pool again,” says Lincoln Trail College Coordinator of Marketing and Public Information Chris Forde. “As we reopen, there will be some additional guidelines in place to help prevent the spread of COVID-19.”

The College is using guidelines from the Illinois Department of Public Health and the Centers for Disease Control for the reopening of the Rowland-Nicholas Natatorium.

- Occupancy will be limited to 50% capacity.
- Anyone entering the facility must wear facial coverings. Face masks may be removed while engaging in swimming activities. Exceptions will be made for children under the age of 2 or for people with medical conditions or disabilities that prevent them from safely wearing a face covering.
- Operators, employees, and patrons must frequently wash hands or use hand sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol). Sanitizer will be made available.
- Operators, employees, and patrons must adhere to social distancing rules and stay at least six feet apart.
- Employee and patron temperature will be checked before entry and patrons must self-certify to be COVID-19 symptom free before entering the facility. At mid-shift, temperature checks will be required for employees.
- Employees will follow all existing IECC guidelines related to COVID-19.
- If a patron is experiencing any COVID-19 symptoms, they must leave immediately. Cleaning and disinfecting will take place immediately.
- No concessions will be offered. Patrons may bring water for personal use.
- Locker Rooms, Showers, and Restrooms will be available and cleaned and sanitized regularly. The use of these facilities will be limited by social distancing guidelines. This could cause some delay in the use of showers.
- Face-to-face employee and customer interaction should be minimized as much as possible while observing social distancing guidelines and mask requirements.
- Items like kickboards and pool noodles will not be supplied by LTC. Patrons must supply their own life jackets. There should be no sharing of any such items.
- Doors, tables, and high touch surfaces will be sanitized regularly.
- Ventilation systems of indoor spaces will be used to increase the circulation of outdoor air as much as possible. The practice of opening doors/windows and using fans will occur as needed.
- Seating areas will be adjusted to ensure that individuals cannot congregate without adherence to social distancing rules.
- Physical cues or guides such as lane lines in the water, tape on the decks, floor, and sidewalks will be displayed and adhered to.

Lincoln Trail College will offer water aerobics classes when the pool opens. There will also be times available for lap and open swims. An updated calendar with the pool schedule is available at www.iecc.edu/ltpool.


