

EXCITING SCHOLARSHIP OPPORTUNITY

Six (6) full tuition scholarships are available for students enrolling in the first year of the Certified Medical Assistant (CMA) program offered at Frontier Community College. The CMA program is a two year, 71 credit hour degree. The recipients will be selected from students enrolled in the Certified Medical Assistant program this fall.

The CMA program trains students to perform a variety of clerical duties and assist with clinical situations in a health-related setting. Students in this program will develop an in-depth knowledge of conceptual, professional, and medical skills.

Certified Medical Assistants perform clerical duties, take vitals, as well as collect and prepare specimens. Most CMA careers are found in doctor's offices, clinics, and other healthcare facilities. The median yearly pay is \$33,600, with an expected job growth of 23%.

IMPROVEMENTS CONTINUE WITH TITLE III



After months of planning, Room 21 of Mason Hall is officially under construction. Contractors began working on the space Thursday, June 25 with initial demolition completed in preparation of converting the area into a state-of-the art laboratory classroom for the new Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) program.

As construction progresses, the lab will be outfitted with 20 student lab workstations designed for durability and functionality. Each student station will be equipped with a new medical laboratory grade microscope and accessible storage. Smart classroom audio and visual equipment will be purchased and installed as part of the remodel to provide students an

optimal learning environment.

Along with refrigerator and freezer storage, the MLT lab will be stocked with a variety of sophisticated diagnostic equipment including but not limited to analyzers, centrifuges, and agglutination viewers to provide students hands-on technical instruction preparing them for clinical experiences in local health care facilities.

The remodel, made possible through a U.S. Department of Education Title III grant, is the first phase in establishing a suite of science labs in Mason Hall. In Summer 2021, Rooms 22 and 23 will undergo similar remodels with the goal of improving health science classroom environments.



The current remodel of Mason Hall Room 21 has a targeted completion date of July 2020 with outfitting completed in time to welcome the MLT program's first student cohort when Fall classes begin on August 20, 2020.

YOUTH CLASSES HELD DESPITE PANDEMIC



Community youth classes were held as scheduled at Frontier Community College this month with classes such as painting, tie-dye, and sign-language still able to be offered for community youth despite the national pandemic.
