

Solar Savings Update

Several programs switch places as program offerings grow



WVC is making necessary changes to accommodate both its burgeoning PTA program and its Adv. Manufacturing program's move back to campus. These changes are happening this summer.

On May 11, the President's Council met and proposed moving Small World, previously located in the Science Building, to the International Building. The International program would move to Main Hall 121.

International moved to the former Fitness Center on June 7 while Main Hall 121 is being made ready. Small World moved into the International Building the week of June 14.

The Physical Therapy Assistant program will be moving into Small World's former space, and the Advanced Manufacturing program will be moving into the space formerly occupied by the pool.

WVC's in-person graduation a success



WVC held an in-person graduation on May 14, 2021, in the Spencer Sports Center. Attendance was limited to 500 guests. Masks were required for entrance into the ceremony.

The ceremony was conducted pursuant to the guidelines set forth by local, state and federal authorities. WVC conferred 179 degrees and certificates during the ceremony, with more than half of the graduates deciding to walk in the ceremony.

The college did take a number of extra steps to ensure the safety of its community members, graduates, faculty and staff at commencement.

In addition to limiting the number of guests, WVC spaced out the graduates and guest seating per CDC guidelines. The college also used pre-recorded music for the processional and recessional and recorded the various awards that would typically be presented during the ceremony.

WVC Archery Warriors continue hitting their mark



At the end of May, WVC competed in the 2021 Collegiate Target Nationals.

The Warriors were up against some large competitors as well, facing off against Texas A&M, Union College, and James Madison University, just to name a few.

Six of WVC's eight archers made it through the first elimination round. Three of those six made it through the second elimination round and shot in the Top 8 of their classes the next day.

Sydney Jones and Dillon Thompson took 2nd place in the mens and women's mixed team, and Jalyn Shoemaker took 6th in women's Bowhunter. Dillon and Jalyn earned All American awards.

Archery Coach Earl Lawrence was proud, "We finished 9th out of 30. We are the only 2-year college in the Top 10; I think there was only one other 2-year college in the 30 schools who completed. I can't say enough how proud I am of these kids and want to thank everyone who helps make it possible."

WVC's TRIO Upward Bound staff selected as presenters at COE



The TRIO Upward Bound staff at WVC were selected to present at the Council for Opportunity in Education (COE) conference in Atlanta, Georgia.

According to its website, the COE is a nonprofit organization, established in 1981, dedicated to furthering the expansion of college opportunities for low-income, first-generation students, and students with disabilities in all 50 states. The Council works in conjunction with colleges & universities to help low-income students enter college and graduate.


