ATHLETIC FAMILY MENTORSHIP PROGRAM





Fairfield, Illinois is known as the home of friendly people. Yet, Amanda realized that many of our athletes do not experience the charm and hospitality that gives the town its nickname, as they have no off-campus ties to the community.

To solve this problem, Amanda has created the Athletic Family Mentorship program. This program will attempt to place approximately 96 athletes attending FCC in the fall with “Host

Families.” While the students will not live with the “Host Families,” the families will still act in many ways like a host family for an international student. The family will invite the student to dinner at their house, participate in various family events when they can, and keep in contact with the student throughout their time here.

This participation in family activities will give students not from the area a chance to immerse themselves in the community and hopefully make some friends along the way. This effort helps create a support system for the athletes, many of who are away from their family for the first time. This program is also an excellent chance for local community members to learn more about another culture, as many of these athletes come from countries around the globe.
