

PTK creates new student lounge

Olney Central College students have a new place to relax and grab a snack between classes — The Keep Student Lounge.

Located in Room 207A on Wattleworth Hall’s second floor, the newly dedicated student space includes study tables, comfy chairs, a microwave, a fully-stocked refrigerator and a Keurig coffee maker. Students also have access to a food pantry with microwavable meals and a variety of snack items. The room is available to all students from 7:30 a.m. to 3 p.m. Monday through Friday.

A service project of Phi Theta Kappa, its members have been working to transform the former office since spring semester.

“This is a great space for students to study, talk and get something to eat,” said PTK member Jiazhen “Cookie” Zerrusen. “It gives PTK a nice way to support students. It breaks the traditional idea of student services like a library or computers. Supporting students isn’t just providing financial aid — it can be nice, cozy little things like this.”

The room also features a Little Free Library cart where students can take and exchange books. Students also can view upcoming events on the room’s bulletin board, and OCC clubs are encouraged to post announcements.

“I think it’s cool I helped create something that will be here after I’m gone,” said PTK President Robert Wray, who worked on the project over the summer with Zerrusen. “This is going to be a great space for our students.”

The lounge opened on Aug. 18 and PTK Advisor Kaitlyn Weger said the response has been overwhelmingly positive.

“Students are using it and we hope they are enjoying it,” she said. “We want to thank Maintenance for their help in putting up shelving and tables and painting the walls. They were a huge help in completing the project.”

Earlier this month, The Master’s Hands in Olney donated food items to restock the food pantry.

PTK is currently accepting individually packaged and microwavable food and drink items for the student lounge. Donations can be dropped off at the library circulation desk.



IECC Priority Application Deadline October 28

Frontier Community, Lincoln Trail, Olney Central and Wabash Valley colleges are encouraging high school seniors to apply before the October 28 Priority Deadline to ensure they are first in line for scholarship dollars.

Last year, Illinois Eastern Community Colleges awarded more than \$272,000 in Success Scholarships to 408 area students.

IECC Director of Financial Aid Krystle Riggle says, “Applying for the priority deadline gives local students the opportunity to receive a scholarship for any of the four IECC colleges. We are excited to help students find different avenues to afford a top-rated education close to home.”

Initiated in 2020, the tuition awards are made available to Community College District 529 students who have committed to attend the IECC colleges by completing the admissions application and the Free Application for Federal Student Aid by the Priority Deadline date. The Success Scholarships are renewable for up to four semesters — Fall 2023, Spring 2024, Fall 2024 and Spring 2025, not including summer courses.

“The awards demonstrate IECC’s ongoing commitment to seeing area students successfully achieve their higher education goals,” said IECC Director of Enrollment Management Andrea Loll. “We encourage all our area students to complete the necessary documents and see how much they can save by attending one of the IECC schools.”

Students can go to www.iecc.edu/priority to begin the application process now and file their FAFSA starting October 1. The FAFSA must have school code 001742 – Illinois Eastern Community Colleges listed.

Loll says this year students will receive additional assistance in applying as each college now has a dedicated admissions representative. During September and October, these recruiters will visit IECC District high schools on a weekly basis.

“We are looking forward to partnering with our area high schools,” Loll said. “Our recruiters will be available to answer questions and guide students in the application process. They also will be working with Financial Aid to help students create their FAFSA IDs, expediting the process and making it easier to walk parents and students through the FAFSA application. We really encourage students to complete their FAFSA — the earlier, the better. Even if students know they are going to a four-year school, we still want to help them with the process. As community colleges, we are part of the community, and we want students to know we are here to serve them.”

Success Scholarship awards will be announced prior to the Thanksgiving holiday.

“IECC is very affordable. We want to show students how affordable the IECC colleges can be and to let them know money is available to assist them financially,” Loll said. “We want to help our students and their families by providing the best option for them. With the priority deadline, families can see just how much money they can save by attending FCC, LTC, OCC or WVC.”

Enroll now in an 8-week mid-semester math course


Did you drop a math class this semester or change your major and need to complete a math course?

OCC student Julie Harrolle receives Juanita Harris Nursing Scholarship

The family of Olney Central College nursing graduate Juanita Harris chose to honor her legacy by presenting a scholarship in her memory to a second-year Associate Degree Nursing student.

Julie Harrolle, of Olney, is the recipient of the \$1,200 monetary award, which can be used for tuition, fees, books, travel or other college-related expenses.

"The scholarship will allow me to work fewer hours and to concentrate on my education," she said. "It is a blessing. I know it didn't seem like a lot of money to her family, but it is a huge deal to me. It has inspired me and hopefully one day I can give back in the same way."

Harris' daughter, Debra Harris Kircher, presented Harrolle with the scholarship on behalf of her brother, Robin Harris, and the entire family.

"Being a nurse was so important to Mom," Harris Kircher said. "It was her life, and she loved her work. She was a good nurse. She was dedicated to quality, professional care, kindness, and compassion. She dedicated herself to Christian nursing. She helped a lot of people in the church and the community. She was the friend they always came to."

Harris passed away from cancer on Feb. 21, 2021, at age 91. A non-traditional student, Harris chose to pursue a degree in nursing after her husband sustained injuries in a motor vehicle accident, which left him paralyzed.

An honors student, Harris completed her associate degree in nursing in 1974, and later earned a bachelor's degree in nursing from Southern Illinois University at Edwardsville.

Harris spent her entire career serving in private medical offices. She especially enjoyed the 20 years she worked at Dr. Kimball Ewell's practice in Eldorado before retiring at age 75.

Harris inspired others to pursue nursing careers as well.

"We were proud to have four nurses in the family," Harris Kircher said. "I became a nurse, her granddaughter has achieved a master's degree and is completing her studies as a nurse practitioner, and her granddaughter-in-law is also a nurse."

The family is excited to assist Harrolle in reaching her goal.

"We want to thank all of the friends, family and co-workers who contributed to the scholarship fund," Harris Kircher said. "We wanted to help someone like Mom, who was trying to go back to school with a family, and maybe needed some additional financial support. We were honored to give the scholarship to Julie."

Owen Hough and Summer Sanders are the first to receive two of the new OCC Theater scholarships. Both are current students at OCC and will be participating in upcoming productions at the theater.

Sanders began her stage time in the OCC/OAC Summer Children's Theatre Workshop when she was in junior high and has done several shows at OCC since then.

Wright comments, "Summer is a great story for us. She started with us very young and has been in several shows with us. Now, through her hard work and talents, she is receiving a scholarship to continue her education. As our summer children's program continues to grow, I expect to see many more students who are in our summer program excel on stage and receive scholarships from their work."

Hough has participated in both Richland County High School and OCC Theater shows and plans to transfer after OCC to a four-year university with a goal of becoming a music/theater educator.

"Owen is just a great kid," says Wright. "He has come so far and has worked hard on his abilities musically as well as on stage. I have no doubt that if Owen continues the work ethic he has shown with us, he will be able to accomplish his goals."

When asked why the scholarships were an important part of his overall vision for the future of OCC Theater, Wright discussed the significance of giving students a chance.

"I come from the world of sports," Wright reflected. "Signing a scholarship to play a sport at the collegiate level is a big deal. It is also a big deal when a student excels in music or theater and can receive a scholarship to continue their passion at the college level. We look forward to offering scholarships every year and to give students a chance to take that picture of them signing their scholarship offer with their families and teachers/directors."
